Michael Mostoller Architect is a firm dedicated to quality, character and economy in the architecture of dwelling and city. Mr. Mostoller has been a leader in urban housing since 1965. The firm has completed a series of innovative projects in residential and community structures. We have extensive experience in renovation and new construction. Our work includes public housing, townhouse renovations, apartments for senior citizens, infill townhomes, facilities for homeless families and single individuals, facilities for Head Start and daycare, community buildings, religious structures, university buildings, offices and shops, and private residences. Current work includes a market rate urban complex of townhomes and apartments at the Trent House Park in Trenton, NJ, and the expansion of the Lawrence Apartment complex at Princeton University for a new residential quadrangle for graduate students, post-docs, and University Fellows. Recent completed work includes a synagogue in Montclair, NJ where particular attention was paid to its integration with an existing Historic Register home and a residential neighborhood.

The Firm's work has received national recognition and awards. A study of designs for SRO Rooms and Furniture won a New York City AIA Design Award in 1985. Amandla Crossing, a transitional residence for homeless families sponsored by the Middlesex Interfaith Partnership with the Homeless, won a New Jersey AIA Design Award. Cityside, family housing in renovated structures in Trenton, won an award for Excellence in Downtown Development in 1990. Our design for Amandla II— permanent housing for homeless women with children, won a New York City AIA Design Award in 1995.

Mr. Mostoller is a Professor at the School of Architecture, New Jersey Institute of Technology, and past Director of the Undergraduate Program. At the school he teaches history, housing and design. He won a University Excellence in Teaching award in 1993 & 1999. He is a graduate of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and holds a graduate degree from Harvard University. He has taught at Rensselaer, the Graduate School of Design at Harvard, the Yale Architectural School, and Columbia University. His scholarship and research, focused on residential design, affordable housing and housing the homeless, has influenced professional design, code reform, and community and political awareness. He is preparing a history of housing design in the United States begun on a grant from the National Endowment on the Arts and is researching current issues in housing. His drawings have been published in *Progressive Architecture*, *Inland Architect*, *New Jersey Architect*, *Skyline*, *Express*, and *the New York Times*. His work has been exhibited at The Drawing Center, the Rosa Esmon Gallery, the Cooper-Hewitt Museum, Cooper Union, the Urban Center Gallery, Hill Wallack, the gallery at Bristol Myers Squibb and Columbia University. In May 1994 he was invested into the College of Fellows of the AIA for his work in education, scholarship, research and practice. In 1995 he was named Distinguished Professor of Architecture at NJIT. In 2005 he was named a Master Teacher.
